

FLETCHER Stole the Show From 21 Savage at Juice Jam

SYRACUSE, N.Y., Sept. 9, 2019 – Juice Jam was on Sept. 8, 2019, at Syracuse University, and featured performances by Kilo Kish, Mt. Joy, FLETCHER, EARTHGANG and 21 Savage.

Students came excited to see 21 Savage, but ended up being even more impressed by FLETCHER, an up-and-coming singer and songwriter from Wall, New Jersey.
